Today's Daily Encounter 1. Lessons From Geese

"There are different kinds of service in the church, but it is the same Lord we are serving. There are different ways God works in our lives, but it is the same God who does the work through all of us. A spiritual gift is given to each of us as a means of helping the entire church" (1 Corinthians 12:5-7, NTL).

Fascinated by the conduct of flying geese, Dr. Robert McNeish, wrote "Lessons From Geese" for a sermon in his church in 1972. Demonstrating the power of a good idea, his essay spread and has become a classic statement of the importance of teamwork.

Fact: As each goose flaps its wings, it creates an "uplift" for the birds that follow. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

Fact: When the lead goose tires, it rotates back into formation and another goose flies to the point position.

Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership. As with geese, people are interdependent on each other's skills, capabilities and unique arrangements of gifts, talents or resources.

Fact: The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement, the production is much greater. The power of encouragement (to stand by one's heart or core values and encourage the heart and core of others) is the quality of honking we seek.



Fact: When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it to help and protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again. Then they launch out with another formation or catch up with the flock.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as geese, we will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.

Fact: When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help and give our help to others.¹

Suggested prayer: "Dear God, please help me to know what my God-given gifts are, develop them, and use them to work in harmony with others to help do your work in your church here on earth. Thank you for hearing and answering my prayer. Gratefully, in Jesus' name, amen."

Lessons from Nature #2

6/9/07 –Sat. morning (#2) - Charlie -

"Lessons from nature" aren't always good lessons to follow. We need to discriminate and think to determine good examples, from nature, and from other people.

Some people are good examples. Some are poor examples. - Scary thought... What if the purpose of your life is to be a an example to others of what they should avoid?

"Sat morning (1)" was sent as the daily e-devotional that day. It might be posted in the archive at the www.CrimsonWhite.org, or maybe not yet. (You can get on our <u>daily</u> email distribution by just asking. We even snailmail

each week's set to a couple people.) I wrote that and this as I sat on the "lanai" (that's the fancy name for a closed in porch in FL) at my mother-in-law's place in FL. I was there to help close up for the Summer, put her on a plane back to our house for hurricane season, and then I'd drive her loaded-up car up to our place.

Yesterday we were walking around the yard and saw several "interesting" things. Among what we saw was Charile.

Charlie is a 30" tall (I figured that by observing him next to a wall and then went and measured the highth of where I saw his head on the wall, he really is that tall) snow-white egret that comes to the neighbor's patio at the back of their home. Charlie also generally wanders around their yard. - This picture is in their carport. - Behind the homes is a storm water drainage ditch, and beyond that is

the pond, generally maintained by rain water, too. There must be some small fish in it because there are usually long legged birds wading in the shallow water around the edge, fishing for their breakfast or lunch.

When she sees Charlie, she throws him a slice of bologna. (I didn't ask if it was Oscar Meyer's. Charlie probably isn't very particular about his bologna anyway.) Charlie waits, as if to not appear to be too aggressive or anxious and just grab it and run, but waits as if to in his own way to say thank you, then picks it up walks over to the drainage ditch and drops it in the water. Then he grabs it and shakes it a bit tearing off a bite and then eats it. In the shaking a few small pieces tear off. He reaches down and grabs in the water for the little pieces. - A

smaller bird approached. Charlie didn't share his wealth. The smaller bird would have taken even a part where Charlie had ripped it and in shaking it in his beak, it had come apart into a few small scraps. He showed no signs that he was about to share. He stood unmoving over his bologna prize. The other bird finally left. Charlie takes the slice and again shakes it ripping off a chunk, and shaking that, it separates into one piece in his beak and a couple small ones that drop back in the water.

Lessons from nature... (1) Bologna is okay to eat. But (2) I prefer my bologna as part of a sandwich and not dipped in the storm drain ditch. And (3), my mommy taught me that it's nice to share. If it's a pack of crackers, I'll offer you a few, or break my cookie in half, or if it's my sandwich, you'd probably want me to tear or cut it so you didn't get part where I bit into it. (The other bird wouldn't have cared if it was a piece that fell from Charlie's beak.) So the only good lesson here from Charlie is that bologna, even the less

expensive brands, probably won't kill you. For the other things Charlie did, he's a poor example. Do NOT do what Charlie does with his bologna.

Todd & Jeff Hafner also have some things to say about NOT taking "lessons from nature" in their book. I picked up one of their books recently, started to read it... pretty good stuff ... interesting style and format ... went back and bought a second copy knowing I'd find someone to give it away to, and already have.- Wake Up and Smell the Pizza, (Todd & Jedd Hafer, Bethany House, 2005, ISBN 0-7642-0033-X). Strange title, good read. ... Here's what they say about taking lessons from nature: (p.48) "We saw a ... "expert" ... the other day, woofing about how monogamy and sexual purity were contrary to the "natural order of things. She noted that most animals have multiple sex partners and have sex whenever they feel like it. To this we retort, "Good point, Ms. Sexpert! But hey, our dogs roll in garbage and drink out of the toilet. Monkeys eat their own monkey-doo. Tigers eat their young.

So maybe it's not the best idea for human beings, made in God's image, to rake their behavioral cues from chimps, dogs, or even wombats."

"One more thing, Ms. Sexpert -- we want to test you to see if you really believe that what's good enough for lower mammals is good enough for humal beings. So if you come to one of our houses for a visit, let's see if you drink out of the toilet. We'll leave the lid up for you."

"If you haven't done so yet, make a commitment, right now, to maintain - or reclaim - your sexual purity until you are married. Make a pact with a aprent, friend, or [pastor]. Make a pact with God."

## "Your Worship Is Too Small"

God is after a life of worship for each of us. It's what Paul calls our "service of worship" — presenting ourselves to Him continually as living sacrifices, transformed in our thinking and awake to His will in the world (Rom 12:2). Unfortunately we tend to turn this service of worship (which takes up our whole life) into a worship service (which takes up about an hour a week). It puts a lot of weight to bear on 30 minutes of music i1 that will be a person's sole worship experience for the week. No wonder people are fighting so hard for their music.

We worship because we are worshippers. We were created with ,this big cavity in our souls that can't be filled with anything but God, and filling ourselves with God on c continual basis is the most fulfilling thing we can do. It is what we were made for.

True worship incorporates our minds in understanding, our strength in service, our soul in wonder, and our spirits in praise. It does not take a song to do this. It takes my mind on God and my whole being focused in His direction. I also believe it is possible to de all this while doing everything else we normally do — in fact, this is what give~ everything else meaning. This is what Paul meant when he said to do everything we de to the glory of God (Co13:17)

It's our life, not a worship service, that will make us worshippers. We don't go to church to worship; we go to church because we are already worshippers. And if someone is a true worshipper, which means their whole life is an act of worship, then what happens f01 30 minutes of music once a week is a small thing indeed.

I often hear people say they need to give God more of their time: longer quiet time, more prayer, more Bible reading. That's good, but I'm not sure God wants more of my time as much as He wants more of my attention. It's not this time for God, this time for work, this time for play, and this time for me. It's the whole thing for God.

If I've lived a week like this and I get to church with my fellow believers filling up *c* room, they can sing in French and play sitars and it won't matter to me. I'll be so happy just to be there and join my voice. however timid or strong, with others who believe

The Bible says, "For God so loved the world (that includes you) that he gave His only begotten son (that's Jesus) that whosoever (that's you again) believes in Him should not perish (that's saved from eternal death, Hell) but have eternal life (given eternal life with God, that's "salvation" or to "be saved")." John 3:16
- ${f C}$  Confess your sin to God. The Bible says, "If we confess (own up to) our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and cleans us..." 1John 1:9.
  - S Submit yourself to His commands and control.
