... This letter is part of a ministry primarily to students and singles. It started with college students. Now about 50% of the mailing list is students, middle and high school and college, and 25% are age 22 to 30, and we'll just leave ages unsaid for the last 25% since, well, they're old. Articles are on character, values, spiritual life, relationships and more ... and some fun.

The theology position is "conservative," i.e. Jesus is God's Son, eternal, part of the single triune God, born of a virgin, sinless, crucified and risen, and is the *only* way to eternal life. We are free to choose Him. He has told us to be holy and that includes behaviors such as: sex outside of marriage is wrong.

Our goal is mail in your mail box about 15 times a year. We're trying to say that <u>you</u> are <u>important enough</u> for us to put this in your mailbox. We care about you and want to encourage your character growth and your spiritual walk. We also distribute a daily email devotional.

Another part of the ministry is prayer. We pray for those on our mailing list as the mail is prepared. When you get mail from us, you know someone prayed for <u>you</u>.

A college student reader chose the name Crimson and White Connection based on Isaiah 1:18 in the Bible "Come now, let us reason together," says the LORD. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool." The cleansing of our nature and our sins is a universal need. If you base your trust for entrance into Heaven in Jesus, God's Son, and His death and resurrection on your behalf, then your crimson stains are made white as wool. Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. There is no other way. If you admit that you can not reach God's standard, are repentant and sorry for your short fall (sin) and have asked Him to forgive you, then He has forgiven you. If you are truly repentant, then there will be evidence of that in your actions, your life. - - If the "religion police" were to arrest you, would you be turned loose for "lack of evidence"? Or would the evidence of your actions convict you of being a Christian?

The Professor and the Chalk


This story has circulated on the web since at least May 1999 when it was sent to me the first of several times. At snopes.com, the origins of the story go back to the 1920. – True or not, probably not, it is a story from which college students should take heed.

It is a rare story, like that of Josh McDowell's, when college results in birthing a Christian. Several other stories including a few readers of the C&WC are where people met Christ on a college campus, or during that 18 to 24 age, or several stories can be told of meeting Jesus in prison. But those are really the reverse exceptions. The statistics from several sources (S.B.C. research and Barna Research to name two) tell us that anywhere from 75 to 95% of "church going teens," from the time they turn 18 (graduate High School) until they are 24, the "college years," will stop attending church and most never return.


"WARNING: College can be Hazardous to Your Spiritual Health." That's on the back of Dr. J. Budziszewski's book, How To Stay Chris-

I read a comment saying the REAL message of the story is "God won't bother doing anything if you won't stand up

for him" or something ... [Now THAT is a pretty intriguing statement!]

You might have seen this before, but I think it's worth reading again:

This is a true story [well now we know it's probably not true, but anyway...] of something that happened just a few years ago at USC. There was a professor of philosophy there who was a deeply committed atheist. His primary goal for one required class was to spend the entire semester attempting to prove that God couldn't exist. His students were always afraid to argue with him because of his impeccable logic. for twenty years, he had taught this class and no one had ever had the courage to go against him. Sure, some had argued in class at times, but no one had ever really gone against him because of his reputation.

At the end of every semester on the last day, he would say to his class of 300 students, "If there is anyone here who still believes in Jesus, stand up!" In twenty years, no one had ever stood up. They knew what he was going to do next. He would say, "Because anyone who believes in God is a fool. If God existed, he could stop this piece of chalk from hitting the ground and breaking. Such a simple task to prove that He is God, and yet He can't do it." And every year, he would drop the chalk onto the tile floor of the classroom and it would shatter into a hundred pieces. All of the students would do nothing but stop and stare. Most of the students thought that God couldn't exist. Certainly, a number of Christians had slipped through, but for 20 years, they had been too afraid to stand up.

Well, a few years ago there was a freshman who happened to enroll. He was a Christian, and had heard the stories about his professor. He was required to take the class for his major, and he was afraid. But for three months that semester, he prayed every morning that he would have the courage to stand up no matter what the professor said, or what the class thought. Nothing they said could ever shatter his faith he hoped.

Finally, the day came. The professor said, "If there is anyone here who still believes in God, stand up!" The professor and the class of 300 people looked at him, shocked, as he stood up at the back of the classroom. The professor shouted, "You FOOL!!! If God existed, he would keep this piece of chalk from breaking when it hit the ground!"

He proceeded to drop the chalk, but as he did, it slipped out of his fingers, off his shirt cuff, onto the pleat of his pants, down his leg, and off his shoe. As it hit the ground, it simply rolled away unbroken.

The professor's jaw dropped as he stared at the chalk. He looked up at the young man, and then ran out of the lecture hall.

The young man who had stood, proceeded to walk to the front of the room and shared his faith in Jesus for the next half hour. 300 students stayed and listened as he told of God's love for them and of His power through Jesus.

You have 2 choices.

You can pretend you never read this or you can send this to your Christian and non-Christian friends – If you pass this on, you are choosing to stand up, and pass on the encouragement we all need every day.

- 1. Delete this and never look at it again.
- 2. Pass this along to your Christian and non-Christian friends, giving them encouragement we all need every day.

I pray you will choose option 2. Sometimes all we have to do is STAND UP.

Top 10 Devotionals

Here's an article from the web on ChristianTeens. About.com about popular devotional books. (I don't endorse everything or even anything they may say blanketly, but what I have read seems to be pretty good stuff. Always examine and consider the sources.)

Their #2, Jesus Freaks, is a good book of short stories (matches my attention span) of people through the ages from 1st century to 21st century that took a stand for Jesus. — I have used these stories to start my classes when I taught in Christian schools and have stirred interest in kids for the book. At one school we gave away over 60 copies of this book, and I only had 90 kids in all my classes. — There is also Jesus Freaks Vol. II (also titled Jesus Freaks, Revolutionaries, same book printed under 2 titles). And there is a volume 3, Jesus Freaks — Martyrs. And another in a different format, titled Live Like a Jesus Freak.

A book that's not on this "top 10" list that I really like, and have given away many copies of also, is *Josh McDowell's Daily Devotions for Teenagers*. It's 365 one-page-per-day of verse + story + question to think about format. Good stuff. "Targeted" to teens, I have found the ideas pretty universal and applicable FOR ADULTS also. There is a volume 2 of this also.

My #3 pick would be *Sister Freaks* by Rebecca St.James. This one is set up with daily stories of girls and women only, but I recommend it as a great read for guys, too. At the end of the week there is a page with questions and space to write your answers. It's a 12 week read/journal.

My #4 pick would be to get on my "daily e-mail list." Almost every day I select something to I've read (use with permission) and often comment along with it, and sometimes write the whole thing myself, and email it out. I try real hard to keep it under 1 typed page. — I miss a few days when we're on the road or circumstances don't let me get to my computer. But that's not often. — And we've got over a dozen people right now without computers that we print and snail-mail my daily piece to in a weekly envelope. (That's part of why I keep to 1 page per day; for printing it to be mailed.)

And there are "classics" like My Utmost for His Highest and materials from Our Daily Bread (from Radio Bible Class, Grand Rapids, MI). And if you want an apologetic slant ICR (Institute for Creation Research) puts out a free daily devotional, mailed quarterly, along with a free magazine... Very interesting stuff if you'd like a little mental challenge. – And Ravi Zacharias send out "A Slice of Infinity." If you've ever heard him on the radio (Let

My People Think) or on a campus speaking engagement, you know you generally need to be wearing your "thinking cap" with his stuff. (Within permission guidelines, I sometimes send his stuff as my daily e-mail.)

There are LOTS of good materials out there. Are you reading something every day?

If you need or would like *Jesus Freaks* or Josh McDowell's book, or *Sister Freaks*, we'd love to send it to you if you'll just write and ask. And it's super-easy to write and get on my daily list (e-mail or snail-mail), too.

I've been thinking lately, "What do I do?" – I used to be very active in church, very visible... had several "titles" like Adult Sunday School Teacher and Deacon. Now I don't have any "titles" in church. There are no "spectators" (from yesterday's thought). SO what DO I "do"?

Well, talking with Marie, and waking up this morning, I was thinking about just what I do... I think I'm an encourager and a helper. I encourage people on their Christian walk, and other ways. And I enjoy helping people.

In the Hallmark TV movie "The Good Witch's Garden" (again last evening) (she's NOT a witch, it's not that kind of movie; I'd recommend finding and watching it; good movie) she says one line, "... the true magic is in helping people." There's actually some good theology there. Jesus said, quoting Leviticus, "love your neighbor as yourself."

I'm not going to give you a list of what I do... that would be sort of "bragging," I suppose. So I'll leave it at that. — The point being that "what I do" is pretty invisible to a lot of people maybe. To those I help, it means a lot. The second point is that I am "doing" my part, the part that God has given me to do.

What has He given you to do? Each little part is a piece of the whole. Ever see a puzzle with a couple missing pieces? Man, you might as well throw away the whole thing, right? Don't know what your piece is? Find out, and do it. Maybe it's a visible piece, maybe it's taking care of and singing "Jesus Loves Me" to the bed-babies, or reading Bible stories to toddlers, or playing soccer with kids, or listening to teenagers, or... or maybe teaching Sunday School, or being the one who asks all the questions in a class and gets a discussion started, or being a deacon, or making breakfast, or cleaning up after breakfast, or ... There are no small jobs, only some people who think the job is too small for them. - Reminds me of a story... A church got a new pastor. He noticed that there was one man who wasn't the custodian, but every week he would show up on Monday evening wearing blue jeans and a t-shirt and clean up the bulletins that were left on the pews, straighten the hymn books, fix the visitor cards in the pews, pick up papers and trash on the floor, etc. After a few months seeing this, he asked one of the deacons who he was. 'Oh, that's Mr. Smith.' 'Who is he?' 'He's the president of the biggest company in town.'


