... This letter is part of a ministry primarily to students and singles. It started with college students. Now about 60% of the mailing list are college students, 20% middle and high school, and 10% are age 22 to 30, and we'll just leave ages unsaid for the last 10% since, well, they're old.. Articles are on character, values, spiritual life, relationships and more ... and some fun.

The theology position is "conservative," i.e. Jesus is God's Son, eternal, part of the single triune God, born of a virgin, sinless, crucified and risen, and is the *only* way to eternal life. We are free to choose Him. He has told us to be holy and that includes behaviors such as: sex outside of marriage is wrong.

This letter and post cards are sent about twice a month. We're trying to say that you are important enough for us to put this in your mailbox. We care about you and want to encourage your character growth and your spiritual walk.

A second part of the ministry is prayer. We pray for each person on our mailing list as the mail is prepared. When you get mail from us, you know someone prayed for you.

A college student reader chose the name **Crimson and White Connection** based on Isaiah 1:18 in the Bible "Come now, let us reason together," says the LORD. Aug 10, 2005 Counter-Culture

On the C&WC a while ago I started adding a "warning message." A warning that it was a dangerous, counter-culture promoting publication.

If you are comfortable in the world, maybe you should access where you are. If the "world" makes you uncomfortable, whether it is the friends, their actions, language (not meaning foreign language but the words they use), then that's a good thing. Good in that you are aware that you shouldn't be there. But not good in that you're still there. Get out. If you are uncomfortable in a worship or church environment, maybe God is trying to tell you something and you don't want to hear it.

How about as you return to school soon? Are you going to blend in with the group? - Which group? - Colleges have the "drug user group," and the InterVarsity or Young Life group, and the "brainiacs." There is the "social/party" group and the "jock" group and the "social drinkers" groups and the alcoholics. And these aren't necessarily mutually exclusive, they can overlap, you can be part of more than one. You could be a jock and be active in YoungLife or FCA. You could be social/party person who also attends InterVarsity.

The first house we bought... The neighbors had neighborhood holiday parties. When we arrived and a host offered us a beer, one of the other neighbors stepped in and said, "Or maybe a Coke?" and then quietly said to the host, "They don't drink at all." It was never a "big deal." Our neighbors learned and noticed that we don't drink. We were still invited to the parties, just always had soft drinks, too. They even came to our house knowing there wouldn't be any alcohol. - For us, alcohol is a matter of not having any identification with alcohol, we're different, unique, set apart. Observers won't say, "What's different? You're no different from the rest of us. You drink too."

So how about you? Will anybody notice your language, behavior toward others, kindness, compassion, what you drink, what you do, with whom you associate, how you dress (modesty, guys and girls), honesty, attitude, the music you listen to, the groups you attend (YL, IV, FCA, BSU, ...), ... Do you occasionally wear a Christian logo shirt. Maybe if YOU wear a shirt, it would attract a few others to stand up also. - I remember a student who wrote me about being unsure about doing a speech and making reference to Bible principles. After the speech several classmates told her it gave them confidence and they then also took a stand for Biblical principles in their speeches.

Here's an email devotional I received:

God's Daily Promises, Fri., July 8, 05

This week's promise: Blessings come from obeying God **Why is obedience important to my spiritual life?**

Today I am giving you the choice between a blessing and a curse! You will be blessed if you obey the commands of the Lord your God that I am giving you today. You will receive a curse if you reject the commands of the Lord your God and turn from his way by worshipping foreign gods. Deuteronomy 11:26-28 NLT

If you will obey me and keep my covenant, you will be my own special treasure from among all nations of the earth; for all the earth belongs to me. Exodus 19:5 NLT

"Those who obey my commandments are the ones who love me. And because they love me, my Father will love them, and I will love them." John 14:21 NLT

Countercultural Obedience

To speak positively of obedience today is be profoundly countercultural. The valid suspicion of talk about obedience is grounded in the experience of authoritarianisms, both

past and present. Obedience is confused with "blind obedience," which is normally odious. Obedience is confused with conformity, with going along, with asking no questions. But obedience really means responsiveness; it is related to the Latin *audire*, to hear, to listen, to respond appropriately. Obedience is not the surrender of responsibility but the acceptance of responsibility for what we respond to and how. Richard John Neuhaus (Quoted in *1001 Great Stories and Quotes* by R. Kent Hughes. Tyndale House. p 295)

Being identified with a counter-culture takes guts. It takes a confidence that the group you're identified with is strong enough to stand the pressure. You need to trust that the principles you're standing for are right. - If you think date-rape is wrong, you'll walk in the "take back the night" program. If you think praying for your campus is right, you'll participate in the see-you-at-the-pole rally. If you think housing for the poor-but-trying is right, you'll do something with Habitat For Humanity, whether it is swing a hammer or eat spaghetti at their fund-raiser dinner. - You'll allow yourself to be identified with them because you believe in their principles and trust the leadership of the organization.

So who do you want to be identified with and in who/what do you trust? Anyone? - Have you ever played the "trust game" by falling and have someone catch you? In the Fall, they often run a cartoon where Charlie Brown has Lucy hold the football and he runs to kick it, she pulls it away, and he kicks the air, falling on his back. Lucy can't be trusted. - Trusting an invisible God usually comes after you have learned that there is someone you can trust. Trusting someone might be scary. Trusting an invisible God can be scary, too, till you learn to trust Him. You'll even begin to *see* Him, all around you. He never fails. Trust me, I know, I've experienced Him and seen His work.

“Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, ‘My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will.’ – Matthew 26:39

There is a concept in the Muslim faith/culture that I first learned of growing up in West Africa, but I’ve since been reminded of it being here in Iraq. It is not a concept that is completely foreign to the Christian faith/culture, but the Muslims I’ve met compared with the Christians I’ve grown up with deal with it a bit differently. It is the concept of “God’s will” and what role we have as His creation. Truthfully I’m not interested in instigating a debate on God’s will vs. Man’s choice, but it is an interesting subject to tackle. Many of the Muslims that I’ve met will often begin phrases with “If it is Allah’s (God’s) will then...”, and though like I said that is not completely strange to the Christian faith at all, the degree to which this statement is taken is different from my Christian faith background. I’ve heard of and witnessed Muslims crossing a busy intersection and barely looking to check and see if it were safe to cross the street, and when confronted about the issue, their response was, “If Allah wills that my time has come, I can not change it.” When I first encountered this type of faith I quickly tore it apart as reckless and showing complete lack of personal responsibility. However, the more I’ve studied the issue, the more I’ve come to admire the Muslim’s grasp of God’s control over situations, be those great or small. I found myself humbled by my lack of willingness to often relinquish control of situations to God, as well as my lack in ability to have complete faith in God regardless of the consequences. Though I am still a fan of understanding levels of personal responsibility (i.e. looking both ways before crossing the street), I am learning to become an even bigger fan of total and complete trust in God in ways that say, “Lord I know that whether the outcome of the situation is good or bad from my perspective, it will ultimately always be good from Your perspective if You are allowed to have the steering wheel of my life.” And there you have it, my little sermon that precedes my lengthy email updates. I should probably start writing outlines for my emails so that you can skip to the part you want to read. Anyway, moving right along... I’m not going to make it to my sister’s wedding, which has been a struggle to deal with, but the struggle has not been without an outpouring of God’s goodness. The verse that I quoted at the top of this email was the scripture that accompanied the devotional I read on the day that I found out that I might not be at the wedding. As I read the verse, I found myself praying that prayer, “God, if there be a way, please let me be at the wedding in Sept, but not as I will, but as you will.” And I did so throughout the day. That night, however, my anger and frustration was getting

the best of me and I called one of my team Sergeants and angrily asked for the contact information of all those in charge of making the decision for when I should return to the USA. I told him that I would get everyone I knew (this includes you guys), as well as my congressman, senator, and all the “we-love-soldiers” care package senders to write them nasty letters protesting the injustice that was being done to me....ok, so it was a bit of a far fetched threat, but you do and say stupid things when you are angry. The sergeant very calmly said, “Ben, hang up the phone and I’ll be over to see you in 10 minutes.” After the sergeant came over, we spent some time with him explaining why the decision was made the way that it was made, but conversation soon shifted away from that topic and proceeded to the topic of faith. To make a long story short, that evening turned into a small Bible study and ended with the sergeant telling me that he really wanted to continue meeting to discuss faith issues. I left the meeting and went into my room and prayed the same prayer I’d been praying throughout the day, only this time it was different. This time God broke through to my stubborn will and I prayed the prayer and really understood it. I realized that what had just happened, the discussion with the sergeant, which might not have occurred unless my date for returning to the USA was changed, was God’s will. God wanted me to have that talk with the sergeant, and perhaps future ones as well, and if one day when I’m in heaven and I discover that that is the sole reason for why my date for departure was changed, it will have been worth it to have missed the wedding. Don’t get me wrong, I would still love to be at that wedding, but there is nothing like the ecstasy that accompanies the realization that you are fulfilling God’s will in your life. And so I won’t be there for the wedding, but I do get to go home and see my friends and family, and I get to do so knowing that God is using me here to bless and to be blessed. So thank you so much for your prayers, they were answered in the perfect way, God’s way.

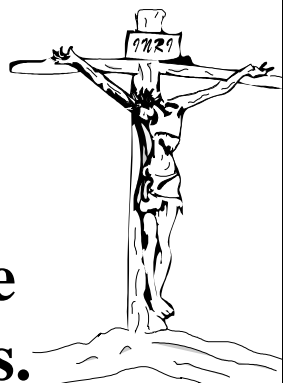

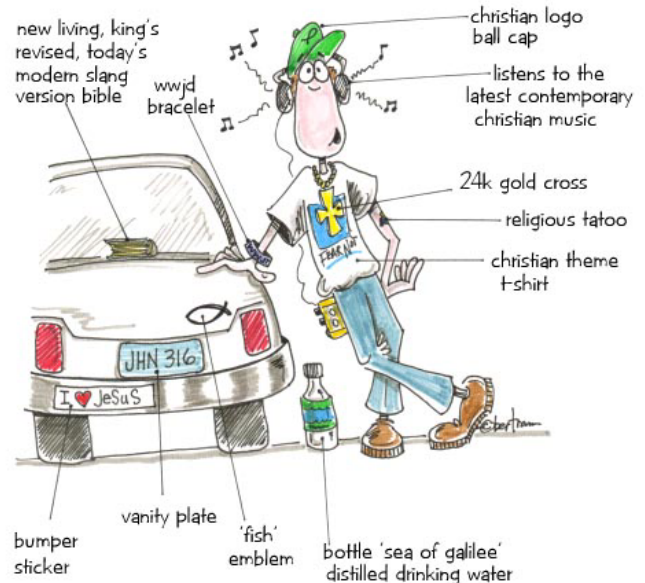

"Moses answered [God], 'What if they do not believe me or listen to me and say, 'The LORD did not appear to you?' Then the LORD said to him, 'What is that in your hand?' 'A staff,' he replied. The LORD said, 'Throw it on the ground.' Moses threw it on the ground and it became a snake, and he ran from it" (Exodus 4:1-3, NIV).

I have read how "there was a 10-year-old boy, who's left arm was damaged and subsequently amputated. He decided to learn judo. His sensei (teacher) was an old Japanese judo expert.

"The boy learned quickly. After a short time, he had mastered one important move. He asked his teacher to teach him more moves. The sensei told him that this was all he would need.

"Soon after, the boy entered a tournament where his opponent was bigger and more experienced. The boy seemed outmatched. After a long match, the opponent seemed to lose concentration. Quickly, the boy took advantage and pinned what seemed to be his superior opponent.

"On the ride home, the boy asked his sensei. 'How could I win with this one move?' The sensei replied, 'You have mastered one of the difficult moves in judo. And, a good defense against that move is for your opponent to grab your left arm.'"¹

Sometimes we don't think we have much to offer in service to God. But we all have at least "one thing in our hand." If we offer that willingly to God, he will use it for his glory. And as the writer of the above story said, "Sometimes your biggest weakness can become your greatest strength."

On Solid Ground Evolution versus Intelligent Design

[This is being debated in what is now sometimes referred to as the "Scopes Trial 2." Just what can a teacher teach in school? Compare theories? Scientific methodology only if it excludes certain evidence and certain conclusions are banned? A teacher must obey the law, but the laws are being challenged. Teachers, be careful what you say to students; it could cost you your job. My stand has been, and you might want to check with your principal about your school's policy, 'if a student asks a question, they deserve an answer.' And students have been known to ask 'What do you think about ____?' Since I started teaching in January of 1973, I've been asked about just about everything - partial birth abortion, rape, drugs, how does alcohol affect the brain, to subjects like what do I think is after death and the end of the world. Paul said "be ready to give an answer." Find out what your school will allow you to answer. You might have to say, "Me personally, I believe ____," so that it is not the school saying ____.]

August 4, 2005

President Bush sent reporters into a tizzy this week by saying that he thought schools ought to teach both evolution and intelligent design. Students ought to hear both theories, he said, so they "can understand what the debate is about."

Well, the usual critics jumped all over the president, but he's absolutely right. Considering all competing theories was once the very definition of *academic freedom*. But today, the illiberal forces of secularism want to stifle any challenges to Darwin—even though Darwin is proving to be eminently challengeable.

Take biochemist Michael Behe's argument. He says that the cell is irreducibly complex. All the parts have to work at once, so it could not have evolved. No one has been able to successfully challenge Behe's argument.

In fact, the scientific case for intelligent design is so strong that, as BreakPoint listeners have heard me say, even Antony Flew, once the world's leading philosopher of atheism, has renounced his life-long beliefs and has become, as he puts it, a deist. He now believes an intelligent designer designed the universe, though he says he cannot know God yet.

I was in Oxford last week, speaking at the C. S. Lewis Summer Institute, and had a chance to visit with Flew. He told a crowd that, as a professional philosopher, he had used all the tools of his trade to arrive at what he believed were intellectually defensible suppositions supporting atheism. But the intelligent design movement shook those presuppositions. He said, however, on philosophical grounds that he could not prove the existence of the God of the Bible.

In the question period, I walked to the microphone and told him as nicely as I could that he had put himself in an impossible box. He could prove theism was the only philosophically sustainable position, but he could not prove who God was. I said, "If you could prove who God was, you could not love God—which is the principle object of life."

I admitted that I had once gotten myself into the same position. I had studied biblical worldview for years and believed that I could prove beyond a doubt that the biblical worldview is the only one that is rational, the only one that conforms to the truth of the way the world is made. But that led to a spiritual crisis of sorts, when one morning in my quiet time I realized that while I could prove all of this, I could not prove who God was. I began to worry: When this life was over, would I

really meet Him?

Some weeks later, as I describe in my new book *The Good Life*, it hit me that if I could prove God, I could not know Him. The reason is that, just as He tells us, He wants us to come like little children with faith. If you could resolve all intellectual doubts, there would be no need for faith. You would then know God the same way that you know the tree in the garden outside your home. You would look at it, know it is there, and that's it, as Thomas Aquinas once said.

Faith is necessary because without it you cannot love God. So as I said to Dr. Flew, if you could prove God, you couldn't love Him, which is His whole purpose in creating you. He later told me that I have raised a very provocative point that he would have to give some thought to.

So, I hope you will pray for Antony Flew—a gentle and courageous man who appears to be seeking God. And we should remember that if this brilliant man can be persuaded out of his atheism by intelligent design, anyone can see it. Those of us contending for the intelligent design point of view, which now includes among our ranks the president of the United States, I'm happy to say, are on increasingly solid ground.
