... This letter is part of a ministry primarily to students and singles. It started with college students. Now about 60% of the mailing list are college students, 20% middle and high school, and 10% are age 22 to 30, and we'll just leave ages unsaid for the last 10% since, well, they're old.. Articles are on character, values, spiritual life, relationships and more ... and some fun.

The theology position is "conservative," i.e. Jesus is God's Son, eternal, part of the single triune God, born of a virgin, sinless, crucified and risen, and is the *only* way to eternal life. We are free to choose Him. He has told us to be holy and that includes behaviors such as: sex outside of marriage is wrong.

This letter and post cards are sent about twice a month. We're trying to say that you are important enough for us to put this in your mailbox. We care about you and want to encourage your character growth and your spiritual walk.

A second part of the ministry is prayer. We pray for each person on our mailing list as the mail is prepared. When you get mail from us, you know someone prayed for you.

A college student reader chose the name **Crimson and White Connection** based on Isaiah 1:18 in the Bible "Come now, let us reason together," says the LORD. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool." The cleansing of our nature and our sins is a universal need. If you base your trust for entrance into Heaven in Jesus, God's Son, and His death and resurrection on your behalf, then your crimson stains are made white as wool. Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. There is no other way. If you admit that you can not reach God's standard, are repentant and sorry for your short fall (sin) and have asked Him to forgive you, then He has forgiven you. If you are truly repentant, then there will be evidence of that in your actions, your life. - - If the "religion police" were to arrest you, would you be turned loose for "lack of evidence"? Or would the evidence of your actions convict you of being a Christian?

Growing

Lauren and Gabriel spent Friday evening, Saturday, and most of Sunday with Gramma and Grampa (that's Marie and me). We did such simple things like Lauren helped mix the cookie dough and she and Grampa made chocolate chip cookies.

And Saturday evening we went to a performance by RocFish (www.rocfishkids.com) where they did a updated, musical interpretation of the Prodigal Son starting at Luke 15:11. This version had a daughter on an Australian farm that takes her inheritance and goes to the city to become a movie star. She arrives at a 50's style diner and buys all her new friends sodas and sundaes and burgers... that is until her debit card fails when all her money is gone. At this point all her "friends" leave her, too. She works at cleaning up the diner and can eat any left over burgers before she throws them in the garbage. She doubts she can go home. The diner owner tells her she would always be welcome at home and she should go. She does. Daddy is delighted she has returned. - They gave a salvation message of always be welcome to come home to God, regardless of what we've done.

Well, it was a fantastic show with a great message for kids. Gabe, 17 months old, stood on my lap and was mesmerized for 45 minutes of song, dance, and story. Lauren, wanted to move to a center aisle seat to see better and was glued to the action. After she asked, "Why did her friends all leave her?" and Marie explained that they weren't really good friends. They just wanted to stay around her as long as she had money to buy things for them. Real friends do things and stay with you because they love you and care about you.

We got on the scale and measured how tall they were. Lauren just recently turned 5 years old and is 45" tall, at the 90%tile for 5 year olds, and 41# which is the 75%tile for 5 year old girls. Gabe is 18 months and is 32" and 30#, which is right at the 50%tile for height and at the 90%tile for weight. He's a "rock" of a toddler, just the "right" weight for a 3 year old.

In Sunday School on Sunday we touched on some data that says as many as 75% of "church goers" don't believe what the Bible says about being saved - Admit - Believe - Confess - the simple steps I include in every issue of the C&WC. They say things like "If I live a good enough life..." What is good enough? How can you know it was good enough? The Bible says you can KNOW that you have eternal life. So that must be "wrong thinking." "If the good outweighs the bad things..." well the balance you'll be measured in, according to the Bible is God's standard. How do you compare to Jesus? Opps. Not good enough. You lose. It's not "Do you know about God; do you know Him?"

One thing we said in the discussion was that "It's simple... just not easy." Why isn't it easy? Because it means that to confess Jesus as Lord, it means you have to give up control and let Him be in charge. Easy to say. Hard to do. - The Christian life is not a one step deal. It is a process. You take one step, then another step, and the more steps you take ... well, for some people it may be easier, for me it is always a struggle to let Him take over another part of life. But you know what? With each step most Christians find that even if it wasn't easy, it was worth it. And maybe I'm just a slow learner. I still have that part of me that wants to be in control. But I'm still learning and still growing and still learning there is even more and more to being a Christian. And not once, when I take another step, do I turn around and say, "Gee, this isn't working well, I think I want to go back."

Let me tie this together, I hope. Lauren and Gabe are growing in mind and stature. Gabe, even though he doesn't speak more than a dozen words that I understand, was soaking up all the story and songs Saturday evening. Lauren listened, asked questions, and is learning more daily. And they are certainly growing physically.

How about you? Are you growing spiritually? Have you taken that first decisive step of faith and believing that Jesus is God and paid for your sin? Are you growing?

Personal Sweden Update - (Let God lead and provide)

My dear friends and family,

I'm sure you're wondering just why it's been so very long since you've heard from me. I mean, I have been here almost a month now. I would certainly be wondering such a thing. Well, aside from the fact that I have had very little internet access, the explanation isn't an easy one, but here goes:

I left the Gordon family after staying with them for only two nights. Of course the Lord knew that I would end up in such a situation, and he provided friends for me along the way who were marvelous to open up their homes to me as well as to provide me with food and other basic needs. When Jesus says in Matthew 7 that he clothes the lilies of the field and feeds the sparrows and that he'll meet our needs in an even greater way, he isn't kidding. There were moments over the course of a two-week period that I didn't know where I would go next or how I would have enough money or food, but God provided in miraculous ways for my needs. He also reminded me during that time that he alone is in control and I need only to trust and depend on him in order for him to fulfill his will in my life.

During this time, I struggled considerably with the question of whether or not I had misheard or misinterpreted God's call on my life, to minister to the people of Sweden. I sought God's will and direction and discernment with all my heart, and he reminded me in small and large ways that he has indeed called me here and that he has a purpose for me here in Sweden.

Mia and Jonas, my fantastic friends who stayed with me a month this summer in Shelby, but who do not know the Lord, took me to a birthday party with them the day after my whole job catastrophe. One of the birthday girls, Maria, began to ask me questions about why I was in Sweden, which led to me sharing my faith with her. Within minutes, our picnic table of two was filled with eight attentive Swedes who all hung on what I had to say about God and Jesus. One guy, Martin, even leaned in and said, "What she's saying is true. I also believe it." I was amazed! God was working in and through me in the midst of my own "crisis." Glory to him!

Then, my dear Mia, slightly inebriated, put her arm around me and said, "You know, this is why I love Jordana. She doesn't believe the same things I do, but she doesn't force her beliefs on me. And she's very sincere about her faith and takes it very seriously, but she's not judging me. Unlike the Christians here in Sweden, she'll actually come to parties with us and hangs out with us and love us for who we are. I have so much respect for her because of that, and I really want to believe what she says."

I almost fell off my seat. Mia, with whom I have shared the Gospel countless times since we became friends in 2002, actually served as a witness of Jesus Christ! And later that evening, on the way home from the party, then sober Mia shared that she has prayed many times and that she really wants to have the faith I have. Praise the Lord, and keep praying for her!!

The following week, I went up to Stockholm for an au pair interview with another family. Although they were super nice, I didn't feel that I should work with them. As they were also trying to decide, they offered up their home to me for a week if I needed to stay there! God not only provided one shelter for me but several options! I stayed at my friend Malin's flat—she is a believer—for a few days while she was in England, researched many other jobs, and lined up interviews. Within days, I had arranged quite a few family interviews, and I began to get quite excited!!

The following Saturday, I went to meet the Öhman family in Bromma, just outside of Stockholm city. I instantly fell in love with the parents and their children and agreed to a trial workday the following week. Long story short, we worked out a contract, and I started working the following Monday, 22 August.

Before beginning work, I had to travel yet again down to see my friends Mia and Jonas, who live in Osby, a small town in the southern region of Sweden called Skåne. On the way down, I had the privilege of sitting next to Johanna, who asked me loads of questions about my faith and who wants to meet up with me soon for lunch in order to continue our discussion! Praise the Lord!!

As I write this, I am halfway through my second week of work, and, although it is quite challenging, it is indeed a blessing. I spend my mornings with two precious girls, Sophie, 10 months, and Louise, 2 years. We go to the park and the lake a lot, and, during our long walks, I sing them songs about Jesus and tell them how much he loves them, and they bless my heart!

In the afternoons and evenings, in addition to taking care of the girls, I also work with Markus, the Öhman's 6 year old, who has Asperger Syndrome, which is a high-functioning form of autism. As the Lord saw fit, much of the training I received while working at True's Kids in Gastonia this year has helped me know how to best deal with Markus and to help him function as normally as possible.

My adjustment to working with the Öhman family has been made easier thanks to Kimia, a girl in her early 20s who has worked with the family for two years but who must leave to begin medical school studies in Copenhagen, Denmark. I have been shadowing her and getting to know how she does things and what methods works best with the children. Additionally, I have had numerous opportunities to share my faith with Kimia, and she has begun to ask me many questions about Jesus.

Kimia invited me to her housewarming party a few weeks ago, and, again, I was able to share Christ with quite a few people, which is so exciting for me and for the Kingdom! Pray especially for Clem (nickname), who talked with me for almost three hours and couldn't seem to get enough, although he claims that he's a strong believer in science He does admit, though, that he admires me for being able to have faith and that he wish he could do that himself.

Finally, I must share that God has blessed me with a fantastic church family here in Stockholm. One of my friends, Julia, recommended that I visit New Life Church, which is a Baptist/Pentecostal church that conducts services in both English and Swedish. Other than the Swedish part, it is much like my fantastic church in Shelby. You can check it out for yourself at www.newlife.us if you'd like.

Upon my first visit, I was instantly greeted by several people when I entered the building, and two of them asked if they could sit with me during the service! We sit at small café-like tables and have *fika*, Swedish for a type of coffee/tea/pastries snack time, in the middle of the service as part of our time of fellowship. We sing many songs in both Swedish and English, and the pastor teaches straight from the Word, which is a great blessing! And most Sundays, the services last two hours! But no one goes out for lunch after church here, so I guess that's not a big deal. ☺

I had the opportunity to go with the church on a retreat this past weekend to gather with at least half of the 200+ attendees just outside Falun, four hours north of Stockholm. We spent loads of time fellowshiping, sharing, and worshipping together, and it was a great opportunity to make new friends. I also discovered that in this small church, five families currently serve as foreign missionaries, and that's not counting the five or so more of us who are local missionaries! Praise the Lord!!

I hope to join one of the cell groups soon if I can find one that meets when I am not working, which is difficult considering my work schedule. This Saturday, I will participate in an outreach event in a local Muslim community, Tjenstad. The city annually sponsors a type of festival for hundreds of poor children there, and the city board has agreed to allow our church to host a test this year, which is phenomenal!!! This festival will be an incredible opportunity to minister to the children of the Tjenstad community through various games, activities, and even fingernail painting!

In my spare time (ha, ha!), I will be taking Swedish classes twice a week starting on 19 September, and I am quite excited and

apprehensive about that. Most people speak English quite well, but I believe that learning the language and culture of a people group demonstrates a true sign of respect. If I want them to listen to and respect me and what I have to say, learning Swedish is the least I can do for them!

Well, I think I have made up for lost time here; hope you're not asleep yet! ☺ I promise that the next update will come sooner and will not be so long! Hopefully, my website will be up and running soon, and I will be able to post frequent updates in my blog in addition to photos. In the meantime, here are a few pictures for you to enjoy. Feel free to email me back if you'd like, but snail mail and phone calls are always greatly appreciated!

- 1) **fika**: (FEE kuh): a nontranslatable word we don't have in English; sort of a snack time that many Swedes participate in several times a day: midmorning, afternoon, and after dinner; this is the first word most visitors to Sweden learn, so I'm helping you prepare for your visit. ☺
- 2) **bra**: (BRoh): not what you think...this is the basic word for *good*
- 3) **hej då**: (HEY doh): goodbye

Do you know what I personally have found to be the hardest part to writing letters...the introduction. I've often heard that you should write it last (at least when your typing the letter), and yet for me the introduction is what sets the tone...the mood if you will, of the whole letter writing process. I only say all this, because, as you've probably guessed I'm struggling with how to start this one. This will likely be my last "mass" email update from this deployment. I'm about three weeks from being "home." One year has come and gone quickly. My buddies and I are currently in the "dreaming" phase about returning home: the "welcome home parades and ceremonies"; the trips the Olive Garden, Outback steakhouse, Cracker Barrel, Krispy Kream doughnuts; and watching a live football game at a decent hour of the night instead of 3AM in the morning. Oh yeah, I was recommended for promotion on October 5, which will effectively make me Sergeant York hopefully by December 1. Thank you all again. I wish for you all God's richest blessings, as there is nothing in life more rewarding.

The vision and future God has for you are connected to God’s greater vision for the whole of creation. 2. Acceptance of, and excitement about your uniqueness as a child of God, gifted in ways that are only found in you. 3. Knowledge of the world around you that God has called you to serve in. 4. Wisdom in the biblical sense of the word.

With these three things you can learn and grow into the person God created you to be, confident that the life you are living gives God honor and glory.

Bringing It Home:

1. Not sure God has a blessed vision for your life? Read the book *The Prayer of Jabez* by Bruce Wilkinson. It will help you trust in the truth that God has a great and purposeful life for you to live.
2. Not sure you truly know and accept your unique spiritual gifts? Ask a trusted friend to tell you what spiritual gifts they think you have. Then, listen to them. They will affirm you in who you are and what gifts you have to offer in your life.
3. Not sure how to get started? Seek wisdom, discernment, and guidance through prayer and the Word of God.

Prayer: Lord, you are the almighty ruler of the heavens and the earth. I pray that you would rule me and guide me to become your faithful child in the world. I want what you want. I desire to be what you want me to be. Help me to surrender and to trust your will for my life. Amen.
